CULTIVAR NAME	'La Luna'
COMMON NAME	La Luna Globemallow
FAMILY NAME	Malvaceae
ORIGIN	A selection made by Randy Mudge from the coastal desert scrub vegetation of Baja California del Norte, Mexico.
GENERAL DESCRIPTION	An open, rounded in outline, billowing shrub to 3 ft tall and wide. Leaves sage green, shallowly lobed, and mealy-textured along fuzzy golden stems. The cup-shaped flowers of clear, silky white petals tinged with pink are held on 1-2 ft long, wand-like inflores- cences. The pink stigma and black anthers add contrast.
WATER REQUIREMENTS	Very drought tolerant.
SOIL REQUIREMENTS	Well drained soil best.
EXPOSURE REQUIREMENTS	Full sun.
PESTS AND DISEASES	Other species in the genus are susceptible to rust infestations, but this has not presented to date in 'La Luna'. Plants in the Malvaceae are often damaged by browsing vertebrates.
HARDINESS	Some tip dieback at 20 degrees F.
LANDSCAPE VALUE	The copious, shimmering white blossoms, long blooming season, and unusual color combination of golden stems, gray leaves, and white flowers make this a fine addition to the dry garden palette. Use it in perennial borders or as a softening element in desert gardens. The inflorescences hold up well in flower arrangements.
PROPAGATION	Strikes moderately well to readily from cuttings.
	To commercially propagate this introduction, interested nurseries need to sign a licensing agreement with the Santa Barbara Botanic Garden.
SALES POTENTIAL	The 3 colors – white flowers, golden stems, gray leaves – are striking against the black of nursery containers. 'La Luna' is vigorous, easy to propagate, easy to cultivate, and showy – a winning combination.
